What is STAR?

- Soil Health program for Colorado began as a grassroots movement in 2019
- Commissioner of Agriculture Kate Greenberg made healthy soils a leading strategy for achieving the CDA mission to promote responsible natural resource stewardship
- The original STAR program was implemented in Illinois. Colorado partners worked together to adapt that framework to meet our needs.
- Basic concept is a free and voluntary tool:
 - Producers fill out assessment forms and scoring sheets
 - Points are assigned for soil health practices
 - Producers then receive a rating of 1 to 5 stars to show how well they are promoting soil health practices and upholding the 5 principles of soil health.
 - This gives them a starting point to further improve practices if needed



5 Soil Health Principles

1. Soil Armor
2. Minimize disturbance
3. Plant diversity
4. Continual living root
5. Integration of livestock

A field with practices similar to what 80% of fields of that type are doing in that region.

★★ 2 Stars (Above Average)

A field beginning to implement soil health principles.

★★★ 3 Stars (Great)

A field implementing multiple soil health principles.

★★★★ 4 Stars (Excellent)

A field implementing several soil health principles.

★★★★★ 5 Stars (Ideal)

A field implementing all five soil health principles.



STAR (for Individual Producers)

- Form is assessed by CDA Soil Health Specialist and feedback returned to producer

STAR Plus

- 3-year program with funds provided through the CDA
- Administered through 17 conservation districts and 3 eligible entities
- CD's and EE's receive capacity building payments of 20k upfront and 2k per producer for each year for 4 years AND \$25k each for equipment purchases
- Producers receive \$75/acre for soil health practice
 - Min of \$1000 and Max of \$5,000 with a 100% match required by producers
 - Covered practices are flexible
- Producers receive technical assistance
- Soil health testing + soil moisture probes
- There will be edge of field monitoring on specific sites



Background

- HB21-1181: Creates a voluntary soil health program in CDA funded by gifts, grants, & donations + a State Soil Health Advisory Committee (effective September 6, 2021)
- Strict producer privacy protections
- SB21-235: Gives CDA \$2M for voluntary soil health practices

Program Future and CSC Grant

- The program is expanding! Our immediate goal is to get 50 entities working with 500 participants.
- Partnering with CSU for soil water, soil health, and soil carbon studies across program and research fields.
- Peer-to-peer learning and pay for performance pilots as well as adding capacity to CDA to run the program.
- Program will develop a regional network of research fields and will help to develop the STAR rating for other western states.
